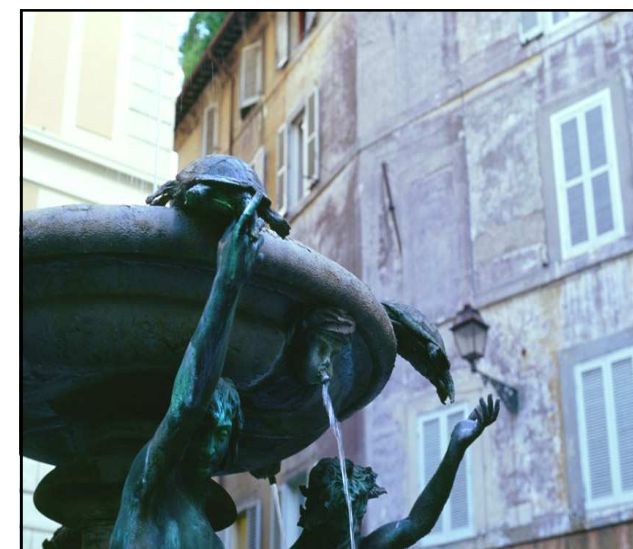

VIOLENCE IS NOT BIOLOGICALLY DETERMINED

The conference aims to study the phenomena of violence, war, and aggression through a new, integrated, comprehensive, and interdisciplinary approach that considers both psycho-socio-cultural and biological factors. It is held in concomitance with the 25th anniversary of the Seville Statement on Violence, a multidisciplinary document elaborated by scientists from all the continents and endorsed by UNESCO.

This document provides scientific information contradicting the myth that the human capacity for aggression makes war and violence inevitable. Most importantly, this document also highlights the role of education in preventing, diminishing and eliminating violence.

The conference is the 33rd of the international workshops that CICA (Coloquios Internacionales sobre Cerebro y Agresión) regularly organizes twice a year in different parts of the world.

CICA is constituted by an international multidisciplinary group of experts on the phenomenon of violence. The main goal of this group is to bridge the gap between biologically based approaches and those built on the social sciences, on the understanding that real solutions will only be found through the integration of insights reached from the interaction of many different fields and levels.

During the conference, participants will also present their latest research findings as far as violence and aggression are concerned. They will also address an important scientific issue: is the Seville Statement still valid or does it need to be updated in some ways?
